# MAC

To take a screen shot and print what visually shows on your screen use the following: press <u>Command Shift 3</u>- this will make a strange sound but the computer is taking a picture of the screen press Command Shift 4- this will give you a crosshair cursor to select a section of the screen


In the window of your hard drive will appear a icon called Picture 1, this is your screen shot and like any other picture file you can edit, paste, or print it.

#### Windows

The shortcut will vary depending on which version of Windows you have. If you have a keyboard with a Print Screen key press that and it will place what ever is on the screen on the clipboard. Just paste that image on your word document and adjust.
