
Book-It! was participated in with nine class members. Alex Cappon was the highest achiever with 1,619 minutes of reading for December.



Pierced Ears

If you are trying to decide whether or not to allow your child to pierce his or her upper ears, you may want to consider this information from the *Mayo Clinic Health Letter*: An infection in that part of the ear can lead to cartilage damage and permanent ear deformity. The upper ear is made of cartilage, which does not have its own blood supply. Antibiotics tend to be ineffective in treating infections in areas of the body that do not have a blood supply adequate to deliver the medication. If the cartilage becomes infected, it could mean surgically removing the infected portion. The results are not attractive.
