The committee needs district personnel, parent, and student representation. Meeting times and dates will be determined by the committee, but we will need to meet at least once or twice a month. Newsletter articles will provide updates on the committee's progress.

Transportation

Last year KCS implemented a new childcare policy that greatly restricts bus changes for students. We no longer allow daily bus changes for students. The only changes that will be allowed this year are bus changes necessary as a result of parent's work schedules. These changes must be received in the transportation office well in advance of the day of the change so that questions and concerns regarding the change can be investigated and resolved ahead of time. Forms must be used; hand written notes will not be accepted. Forms are available on the school's web site or at the Transportation Office. Please fill out a separate form for each child and forward the forms to the transportation office as soon as possible. Completed forms should not be sent to the school building. They can be given to your child's bus driver or mailed to:

The safety and general welfare of students are our primary considerations in the implementation of policies and procedures. When establishing bus routes we consider health and safety, economy of operation and time schedules. We are currently trying to operate our routes in a more cost-effective manner and at the same time be realistic in meeting the needs of the community and students. Keshequa's childcare transportation policy is critical in helping us accomplish these goals. Your cooperation will greatly be appreciated.

It's Back - Homework!!!

Keshequa BOE Policy #8440

Homework provides excellent opportunities for developing good study habits, providing for individual differences and abilities, and encouraging self-initiative on the part of the student. Parental involvement with student homework is essential to making homework an effective part of the educational program. Parents should encourage and monitor homework assignments as much as possible. Parents share in the responsibility for student learning and can assist their child(ren) with homework. The following are some suggestions for giving homework assistance:

- Provide a study area that is as free as possible from distractions, and be sure that it has good lighting.
- · Ask questions about the content of the homework
- If the student asks for help with homework, give your assistance; however, let the student do his/her own work.
- Avoid putting undue pressure on the student.
- Help create a "homework habit" at the same time each night.
- If the student is absent for three or more days, call his/her School Office for assignments.

Study Habits: Activities Which Parents are Encouraged to Undertake

- 1. Develop an after school/evening routine for school days.
- 2. Provide a quiet period in the home each day for reading and study assigned by the teacher.
- 3. Read regularly to your children, including pre-school age children, and also read in the presence of your children.
- 4. Listen to your children read.
- 5. Show interest in your children's work by asking questions and giving praise when deserved and encouragement when needed.
- 6. Prevent your school-age child's work from being damaged or destroyed by preschool age children.
- 7. Get your child to bed at a regular time each night so that he/she gets proper sleep and rest and up each morning with adequate time for a good breakfast.
- 8. Remind your child of books, work papers, etc. that should be returned to school. (Young children need this assistance.)
- 9. See that your child has pencils and papers at school and at home so that he/she has the tools necessary for doing a good job.
- 10. Have your child leave home with the attitude of going to school for the purpose of learning.

Tips on Homework Partnering for Students:

- Find a homework partner in every class where homework is given.
- Exchange phone numbers and call your Homework Partner with questions about specific assignments, if you've been absent or how to do parts of an assignment you don't understand.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to make arrangements with teachers to obtain assignments and their due dates on the first day after an absence from class Otherwise, ALL ASSIGNMENTS ARE DUE AS ASSIGNED.

Visitors

Anyone entering our schools must report to the office before going anywhere in the school. You must sign in and receive a visitor's pass. This procedure will be followed for all people including parents, former students, volunteers, guest speakers, etc. to help ensure the safety of our students.

A hearty welcome back to all our Middle School students, teachers, and staff!! It was a long, hot summer and now everyone is ready to settle back into the routine of working together to prepare students for a great future.

At the sixth grade orientation held on Tuesday, September 6, 2005, students and parents were given the opportunity to meet Middle School teachers, counselor, staff, and principal. Students were anxious to obtain their individual student schedules, locker assignments, and were given a tour of their assigned subject classroom settings. We concluded our orientation with cookies and punch.

There are several instructional changes in our Middle School setting. Our fabulous 8th grade social studies teacher has elected to teach at the Senior High level, taking Mr. Calagaro's position. Mrs. Prinzi will teach the 8th grade, replacing Mr. Cook. Mr. Montulli, newly hired, will be teaching in the 7th grade social studies position. Mrs. Elaine Morgan, from the

Elementary Building, will be teaching 7th grade math. Mrs. Kim Coffey, also from the Elementary Building, will be teaching vocal music and chorus. Mr. Hoffman will be our instrumental instructor, and Mrs. Cario-Schmidt will substitute for Mrs. Gehrig who will be on maternity leave (she had a baby girl, Leah Elizabeth, born on August 6, 2005).

Mrs. Strong, our new special education teacher, will be working in our Middle School 8:1:1 setting, with Ms. Calara as her assistant and Mr. Early as her aide. Ms. Val Canute, teacher assistant, will be joining Mrs. Howes in the 6th grade.

Our Middle School also welcomed Ms. Christine Antalek as our new Director of Curriculum. She promises to be in our building at least two days a week. We are looking forward to working with her.

At the writing of this article we are interviewing candidates for a .5 English position at the 7th grade level and hope to have the person hired by the first day of school.

We are very proud of our 2004-05 achievements on the NYS Standardized tests. As a whole the 8th grade class did very well on all tests. On the NYS science tests we had 50 out of 52 pass at level 3 and level 4. NYS Social Studies results had 43 out of 52 at levels 3 and 4. NYS ELA scores had 32 out of 58 at levels 3 and 4. NYS math scores had 47 out of 52 at levels 3 and 4. They are to be congratulated on a great job. We are very proud of them.

Our year-end enrollment for 2004-05 was 193 students, and we are starting this year with 210 students. So we are steadily growing in population. New this year in the Middle School will be the NYS testing at grade 6 and grade 7. Both classes will be required to take the NYS Math and NYS ELA for their grade levels. Parents will be notified as to when the tests will be administered later in the school year. The 8th grade class will be required to take the traditional NYS tests - math, science, ELA, and social studies.

How Do I Become a Member of National Honor Society & Junior National Honor Society

To become a member of either National Honor Society, or Junior National Honor Society, there is a process and criteria that needs to be met by the student in order to be inducted.

Students are first recognized for consideration on NHS or JNHS by their overall average. To qualify a student in seventh or eighth grade you must have a thirty-week cumulative average of a 89.5. For grades ten, eleven and twelve a student needs a thirty-week cumulative average for that school year of a 90. These grades are obtained after the thirty-week report cards are completed. Students are then notified that they have the opportunity to apply for selection to the JNHS or NHS and will be asked to complete a "Student Activity Information Form" listing all co-curricular, leadership, service and community activities they have participated in. All teachers, advisors and coaches are asked to provide feedback on the qualifying students' scholarship, leadership, character and service to school.

After all this information is gathered a Faculty Council is formed, one for NHS and one for JNHS and it is this council that will review the materials and make the final selection. Once their selections are made, students will then be notified and asked to review their letter of acceptance. The students will then respond in writing as to whether they will accept membership into the Society. The selection of members to National Honor Society and Junior National Honor Society occurs annually. Each year current members are reviewed and new members qualify for membership.

Career Exploration in Radio

Thanks to a generous grant of more than \$11,000 from the Livingston County Office of Workforce Development, KCS launched a summer career exploration in radio at the high school. The program combined education and work to run an a.m., a f.m., a mtv, and an internet based radio station right out of the school. Seven student employees were selected by the county for summer employment and learning. Keshequa teachers Randy Swartzfager and Shawn Bielicki served as program directors for the summer.

The County realized in sponsoring the program that telecommunications and entertainment are growing fields of employment which umbrella a wide scope of career skills and opportunities. Long gone are the days of listening to




scheduled prime time programs on the family's crystal radio. Today the field is bursting with channels on a variety of formats (am, fm, mtv, internet). Telecommunications employs millions. In the information driven society of the new millennium and with the modern advances in technology, it will continue to grow and prosper.

When some think of a radio station, they think only of the on-air voice talent. However, for every voice talent, there are many others that are 'behind the scenes.' Other careers range from producers to script-writers, web designers to operational managers, programmers to production assistants, recorders to electronic media managers, inventory specialists to maintenance workers, directors to newscasters, salespeople

to demographic experts, advertisers to sound techs, planners to announcers, public relation representatives to human resource managers, business managers to board operators, and computer operators to editors to name a few.

According to program coordinator Shawn Bielicki, "The student employees did a great job and were able to see the



many different careers in radio. They even created their own career plan, complete with resume, cover letter, job application, job search, and college program search. I think they are ready to start out in this growing field."

Employees of RadioActive 93.5 fm were Jessica Case, Chris Howarth, David Murray, John Peritore, Allen Pierce, Tim Rymer, and Kara Weitz. Each were able to experience each radio format and frequency and the many technical and business occupations that were necessary to pull together a finished product. Students were able to customize the stations to their own format, make their own letterhead and id badges, complete their own budget, write and produce their radio commercials, prepare their own news and



audio scripts, play their own music, and troubleshoot their own problems. Student employees learned occupational skills as well as communication skills and worked both independently and as part of a team.

Student employee Tim Rymer added, "This program has taught me a lot about business. Radio is a great way to show good workmanship on the job. The help from Livingston County was a great thing for all the teens in Livingston with the grants to help the education of all of us working in the Nunda RadioActive program."

The student employees also visited other radio stations in Hornell, Warsaw, Dansville, and Rochester. Here they were able to make connections between



what they are learning and how it is used in the real world. Teacher Randy Swartzfager closed, "Of all programs I have had the pleasure to supervise, this activity was by far the most creative and energized. With a lot of hard work and a dedicated group of kids, the program ran like clock work and the kids learned a great deal about the business running a radio station."

The program was overseen by Livingston County Office of Workforce Development supervisors William Louvain and Jennifer Duby, who complemented KCS in running such a fine program. Dear Parents,

Here are the bus lists for the start of the 2005-06 school year. They are current as of the time they were sent to the press, and students are listed in order of morning pickup. As in the past, some of the afternoon runs will be driven in a little different configuration. All students have been assigned to their home bus only. All other transportation arrangements need to be cleared through the transportation office per the district Childcare Policy. Please have your child at the bus stop at least ten minutes early for the first few days of school because routes are unsettled. Elementary students who walk to the Nunda bus circle to ride a bus to Dalton should be at the bus circle between 7:45 and 7:50 am. If you drive your child(ren) to school please drop them off in front of the school buildings. The school bus circles must be kept clear for buses to unload. Remember it is unlawful to pass a stopped school bus when the red lights at the top front and rear are flashing, even on school grounds.

This year you will notice that our bus runs have changed dramatically. We have reduced the number of bus routes in the district in an effort to be more cost effective. As a result all bus routes have changed and drivers will have to re-bid runs. Unfortunately, at the time this went to the press we were unable to specify which driver will be your child's bus driver. Bidding will take place at the end of August.

Please be patient with us as we work through this change. Necessary adjustments are very likely to occur. This year students will be arriving home later than in past years due to later building dismissal times and longer routes. Children will not be on the bus for more than one hour once it leaves the high school building. You may also notice several buses using the same roads. This is the result of loading buses close to capacity. Even so, the total miles traveled each day by buses have been reduced resulting in cost savings to the district.
