# Message from the Superintendent

As we roll into the doldrums of March I want to focus everyone's attention on a bright spot...student achievement at Keshequa Central. Our teachers and staff work very hard to provide the best educational program possible for every student and we are very proud of our results over the past two years. Charted for you on page 3 are the results for the last six years of the required New York State Exams for grades 4 and 8 in English Language Arts (ELA) and

math. Level 1 is the lowest score a student can receive and a level 4 is equivalent to a score with honors. To be passing you must be a level 3 or level 4. You will note the significant increases, particularly in math. We believe that changes in the way we deliver instruction are largely responsible, along with an alignment of our math curriculum. We have made a smaller increase, though significant, in the passing rates for ELA. We feel confident that our new Reading First Program will help us to realize future increases. Additionally, all grades must now take these exams, which will help us identify individual weaknesses on a yearly basis.

We have also seen student successes at the high school level, where the Regents Exams are the tools for measurement. You will find a four year summary of these results on page 4. These scores are most impressive and rank right up there with students from larger and more affluent schools. The major area we need to improve on is our participation rate. As reported to you last fall, we need to ensure that 95% of the students who were enrolled as 9th graders must take these exams, and not drop out of school along the way.

Our teachers, support staff and students are to be commended for their efforts and can be proud of their accomplishments. # Superintendent Search Update

As this issue of the Chronicle goes to print there has been no final selection of the next Superintendent for Keshequa Central School. The search is still following the process as the Board of Education makes every effort to find the best candidate to be our educational leader. The Board thanks all those individuals who have been involved with interviews to help make this very important decision.

### Question of the Month: How can I become a KCS Board Member?

### Answer:

- 1. To qualify for school board membership, an individual:
- Must be able to read & write
- Must be a qualified voter of the district (citizen of the US, at least 18 years old, and not adjudged to be an incompetent)
- Must be and have been a
- resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family
- May not be a current employee of the school board
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office
- 2. To run for a school board seat, an individual must:
  - Pick up a petition from the District Clerk, Tammy Peck (468-2541 ext. 1105)
  - Have the petition signed by at least 25 qualified district voters
  - File nominating petition in the office of the District Clerk no later than April 17, 2006 at 5:00 p.m.

There are two seats up for election on May 16. These seats are currently held by John Gordinier and Patricia Kreuzer. Of the candidates who appear on the ballot, the one candidate with the most votes will win a five (5) year term of office and the candidate with the second most votes will win a four (4) year term of office. All future winners of board seats at Keshequa will be for four (4) year terms. This year's election of candidates phases in the reduction of the term of office from five (5) years to four (4) years as approved at the annual meeting/election in May, 2005.

# Harassment Can Be Serious

It is often a question of whether or not a specific behavior or action is harmless fun or goes beyond those boundaries and becomes a serious offense. Our Middle School faculty and staff take any form of harassment and/or bullying very seriously. To better equip our students with a full understanding or what constitutes physical, sexual, verbal harassment and bullying, Mrs. Marsh invited a Livingston County Sheriff to present the facts.

In a presentation by Deputy Phyllis Applin, our 7th and 8th graders learned of the laws and seriousness of physical, sexual, verbal harassment and bullying. Students were divided into small groups by gender, then Deputy Applin presented for about 20 minutes with each small group. For example, she described to the students the fine line between 'innocent' flirtatious behavior and harassment. She gave detailed and explicit examples that could be defined as harassment. Each small group then spent 20 minutes with our Middle School Counselor to answer further questions. The students listened attentively and contributed to the discussions.

Each of our 7th and 8th grade students are well informed of what constitutes physical, sexual, verbal harassment and bullying. Our 7th and 8th grade students are also well aware that any form of these behaviors will not be tolerated and serious consequences will be promptly implemented.
