coasters screaming by. After giving the judge a chance to express his initial comments about the performance, it was time to enjoy the day at the park.



Students may be ready for the year to end, but Keshequa's staff members are already thinking about next year! And New York State agrees. In fact, all school districts must update their Professional Development Plans (PDP) each year. Keshequa will be updating our PDP for next year during a planning day at Genesee Valley BOCES in June. Teachers, staff, parents, and administrators are welcomed by the Special Education Teachers' Resource Center to engage in a day of data review, analyzing program strengths and weaknesses, and finalizing an action plan for teacher growth for the following year.

This year, the planning team will focus on a system of targeting and addressing students' weak areas by using measurable ways to help students improve achievement. It's called Response to Intervention. We would like to spend next year orienting and training teachers, staff and parents in these specific techniques. We are currently using similar techniques with our Reading First program, and students are achieving more than we ever thought they could because the system targets specific needs. When we learn what the needs are, we teach to them, and students' learning improves!

The teachers in Title I and Academic Intervention Services will also be meeting to determine program needs for next year. Any parent who wishes to learn more about programs and services through Title I and other Title grants are welcome to be a part of this consultation. This year's theme is "Be Aware! Cross with Care." The association's contest rules were very detailed and specific this year, much more so than previous years. The rules were discussed in complete detail during art class and students were asked to have their parents go over the rules with them again before beginning their posters. Students had to include the above theme in an original drawing on a specifically sized quality drawing paper, which the art room provided for them. They could not trace anything, nor could they use a computer for any area of their drawing. They could not use collage or any type of glued on images. Copyrighted characters from comics or television was not allowed, and they could not use photographs, magazines, or newspaper images in their drawings! The contest rules stated that all posters needed to show a positive approach demonstrating only proper school bus safety behaviors, and at least a part of a yellow school bus had to be present in the poster! Visual impact, in which quality craftsmanship and use of art elements, will be considered by the contest judges as important factors in the winning design.

Whew! This was a big challenge for students, as the association stated they would disqualify poster entries for not following these rules exactly. The students worked very hard on their

What NYS Tests Can Show Us by Christine Antalek

Spring is here, and soon the season of final exams will be upon us. But already, our students in grades 3-8 have taken both the English language arts and the mathematics state assessments. Students in grade 5 have added a social studies exam to that list. Finally, students in grades 4 and 8 will soon take the science and social studies assessments. Phew! What are all these tests for anyway?

All the assessments in grades 3-8 are part of a staggering change to education called No Child Left Behind, or NCLB, as teachers call it. This federal law focuses on improving student achievement through challenging learning standards, teacher quality, and choice for students in poor-performing schools. The student achievement section of the law requires every state that receives federal education funds to test children in reading and math every year from grades 3-8 and to give high school exit exams.

Those of you who graduated from a New York State school know that we already had rigorous exit assessments - the famous Regents examinations. But New York lacked a consistent set of exams for younger students. So, in 1999-2000, the first exams in grades 4 and 8 were given in math and English language arts. This year, for the first time, every child in New York State was given the full battery of tests. And parents, teachers and students know they are serious business. So how can we make the most of them?

To answer that question, you have

to know a bit about the construction of the test and the score reporting that schools receive. Each test is constructed to match the content standards for that course and grade level. So, every question on every test measures a piece of content that the student was supposed to have learned. The score reports tell us how each child answered each question and what each question tests. By looking at this, we can learn much about individual students and our program. For instance, each student's right and wrong answers are listed on the reports, so teachers can learn exactly what skills that student needs to review. Then, each grade level can see the percentage of students who got each question correct, and the percentages of students selecting wrong answers. We can look at what each question tests and identify strengths and weaknesses by looking at the pattern and percentage of correct and incorrect answers.

The information we learn from the "snapshot" of achievement on each of the state tests can assist us in preparing a remediation program for a student or purchasing textbooks. Indeed, as the Dalton Elementary School began to plan for the purchase of Social Studies textbooks, we looked at the pattern of achievement over the past few years in order to determine what content our new textbooks needed. We used data from previous ELA tests to apply for our Reading First grant. Summer school programs and academic intervention services use the score reports to identify where students need the most help. And finally, teacher professional development revolves around the data we receive from each test and all tests together.

So, although the tests can be strenuous and "not so fun," they are an important source of information to help students achieve and schools improve. More information on the 3-8 assessments, along with sample questions, can be found at www. emsc.nysed.gov/3-8/parentguide/home.htm.

For those students in grades 7 and 8 who were unable to successfully complete their courses, Genesee Valley BOCES will host a summer school site at Mt. Pupils will repeat 6th, 7th and 8th grade if they receive a failing grade in one (1) major subject area or three (3) minor subject areas. Students that meet Summer School Criteria may re-take up to two (2) major subject courses during summer school and if successful reduce the number of failing classes to zero (0), allowing promotion to the next grade. To attend summer school a student must attend the class for 40 weeks during the year and student must have a 50% or better grade for the class.

Major subjects are: math, science, English, social studies, and foreign language.

Minor subjects are: technology, art, home and careers, music, health, computer, physical education. Also, a student must have had good attendance during the regular school year.

It has been a pleasure working with the students of the Middle School and I am looking forward to welcoming them back next year. To our present eighth grade we wish lots of success in the high school and to the fifth grade coming to our Middle School we welcome you. You will really enjoy your new school setting.



Cyber Safety At Home

As educators, we try to do all we can to ensure that your child has a safe and positive experience when they go online here at school:

- Are they accessing age-appropriate material online?
- Are they learning how to evaluate the information they find online?
- Are they interacting only with friends or supportive adults while online?
- Do they know what to do if something troubling happens to them while online?


But what's happening at home or at a friend's house might be a very different experience. According to ISAFE. ORG, 87% of parents believe they have established rules covering their child's internet use, however 36% of students say their parents have *NOT* made rules for their online use.

A lot of behaviors on sites like MySpace or FaceBook have been going on in teen hangouts for generations, but parents were never privy to it. Today however, some shocking and even dangerous behaviors are on display at these sites for everyone (peers – parent – and yes even predators) to see. Some scary statistics from ISAFE.ORG:

- 70% of students go online at least once a week;
- 53% of these students like being alone while 'surfing' the net;
- 39% admit to having given out personal information;
- 31% have IM's with someone they don't know IRL;
- 12% have met a new person from an online experience f2f.

So what can parents do to ensure their child's safety while they are online? Here are several tips that you might use to help safeguard your child.





Educate Yourself.

Today's adults are immigrants to technology, while their children are natives. This might be the first time in history that our children not only think they know more about something, but they truly do.

- Learn the language of online communication
- Study the "lay of the land"
- Understand the rules & laws surrounding online content

Provide A Safe Environment.

- Keep the computer in a "family space" not a private space like a bedroom
- Know all online passwords, IDs and screen names
- Regularly review computer files
- Consider using monitoring and/or filtering controls

Reinforce The Rules of the Road.

- Don't give anyone clues to be able to locate you
- Don't post personal information including full name, address, phone number, school attending, sports activities, job information, etc.

Teach Responsible Use.

- Don't do anything online that you wouldn't do in real life.
- Let children know that responsible adults don't pursue relationships with minors (on or off line).
- Think before you click.
- Make them aware of the legal consequences for some of their behaviors.

When you sent your child off to school you had already taught them to not talk to strangers, to look both ways before crossing the street, to play nice with others and that if anything happens that scares you to seek help from an adult they trusted.

These same safe principals apply when your child ventures onto the information superhighway.

Childcare Transportation Requests

Childcare Transportation Requests (bus changes) for the 2006-07 school year must be submitted to the Transportation Office before July 30th. If your child will need transportation to or from a location other than home, you will need to submit a new Childcare Transportation Request even if the arrangements are the same as the previous year. Requests received **after July 30th** will only be honored if there is room on the school bus and it does not result in altering the bus route.

Each summer the graduating students are removed and the new Kindergarten students are added to the routing program. The routes are then evaluated and updated to balance the loads and mileage. It is our goal to establish routes that are considerate to the safety and needs of the students and the community as well as being cost-effective.

Please note the following important aspects of the district's Childcare Transportation Policy:

- Childcare requests must be filed every year. Requests are valid for one school year only, September to June.
- Childcare request forms must be delivered to the Transportation Department Office by July 30th for implementation in September.
- The childcare facility must be located within the Keshequa Central School District and on an already established bus route.
- A weekly transportation schedule must be established and it must remain consistent throughout the school year.
- One form must be completed for each child needing childcare.
- · Requests will not be approved for students to ride home with other students to visit or attend birthday parties.

You may contact the Transportation Supervisor, Ivan Beardsley, with any questions by calling 476-5789 or by visiting the Transportation Office located in the bus garage just north of the flashing red light at the intersection of Route 70 and Route 408 in Dalton.
