The Lyons Board of Education has a history of presenting small to moderate sized capital projects to voters. In large part because of the expertise of retiring Assistant Superintendent for Business David Alena, Lyons capital projects typically are financed so that the cost to our taxpayers is minimal to zero. Mr. Alena has done another masterful job with our proposed project. If approved, the passage of both Proposition #1 and #2 will NOT AFFECT THE CURRENT TAX LEVY. The reasons why your tax rate will not increase because of this project are:

- First and foremost, the entire project (both Proposition #1 and #2) will generate New York State Building Aid at a ratio of 93.8%. The state pays 93.8% of the cost of both principal and interest.
- Secondly, your New York State Legislators this year approved a new category of school building aid called EXCEL. This new aid is in the category of "use it or lose it". Our EXCEL aid will finance most of the remaining 6.2% of the entire project (both Propositions).
- Finally, the interest income generated from the borrowed funds will also be used to
 offset the total cost of this entire project.

As a reminder, voters will be asked to cast a vote for each of the two propositions. The only reason why we have chosen to present the project in two (2) propositions is to maximize the use of our State Building Aid, in particular the new EXCEL Aid.

With this project, the Lyons Board of Educations' intent is to assure that Lyons children will continue to receive an excellent comprehensive education in up to date facilities that are well maintained, energy efficient and safe. I am appreciative to our Board of Education and Mr. Alena for their financially conservative and academically sound approach to education and capital projects in particular.

Because of the Board's cost effective and diligent approach to Capital Projects, Lyons facilities are well maintained. This project will address all items in our current State Education Department required Five (5) Year Facilities Plan. If voters approve this project, the Lyons Board of Education will not be coming back to the public with another capital project proposal for at least six (6) years.

FLU INFORMATION

As we enter the flu season, there are a few facts to be aware of:
The flu is a contagious viral infection that causes headache,





Technology Communication -

Technology Grants!!!

I would like to inform the community that Brenda Neal, our LES Computer Teacher, will be recognized and awarded a Technology Grant for Lyons Central School District. The Grant will be given this November by the New York State Computer Association for Technology Education at their annual meeting.

Below is a description of the Grant that Brenda wrote for our Lyons students.

Renewable Energy Using Legos and eLab

For children, exploring and investigating is a natural part of the learning process that helps them understand their surroundings. Using Legos and eLabs from the Lego Educational Division students in the Lyons Elementary School will complete hands-on investigations that take the mystery out of the usually abstract concept of energy. The students will explore the ideas of generating, storing, and transferring energy through fun and exciting activities in which they design, conduct and analyze investigations involving many types of energy, including alternative energy and solar energy. They will create solutions to real-world problems, collect data using observations, surveys and through the conduction of experiments, and they will design machines to solve problems that have multiple solutions.

The project integrates well into the scope and sequence of the Lyons Central School District's Technology Plan and will encourage and support different learning styles, another district goal.

VOCAL MUSIC HAPPENINGS

Our vocal music students at the middle/high school have kept themselves very busy during the autumn season. In addition to the choral concert presented in October, several students have taken on other related projects.

Vocal Jazz Ensemble Performance: On October 17, the Lyons Vocal Jazz Ensemble performed at a luncheon for the Retired Teachers of Wayne County. This event was held at the Newark Elks Club. Despite the early performance date, the group did an outstanding job and was very well received. Some of the students even had an opportunity to touch base with a former teacher or two.

Area All-State Chorus: Congratulations to Joey Britt, who participated in Jr. High Area All-State Chorus (grades 7-9) on the weekend of November 3-4 at Waterloo High School.

Congratulations also, to Adam Bacon, Darius Greene, Greg Maddock, and Rebecca Wallis. They have been selected to participate in Sr. High Area All-State Chorus (grades 10-12) on the weekend of November 17-18 at North Rose-Wolcott High School. All five of these students were selected on the basis of their Spring 2006 NYSSMA solo ratings.

Ohmann Theatre Shows: Several of our students are involved in one or more of the productions taking place at the Ohmann Theatre during November and December. Back to Life, a play about the history of Lyons and Wayne County, was presented on November 4-5, and combined the performances of both adults and students. Our Middle School play Pieces and Plays for Christmas Days follows a script written by Lyons resident Larry Ann Evans and will be presented the weekend of December 8-9-10.

The Boys From Syracuse: Students are preparing for musical auditions in November. Once parts have been assigned, they will begin rehearsing for the performances that will take place March 16,17,18, 2007

All-County Chorus: Several students auditioned for All-County Chorus. Sr. High auditions took place at Palmyra-Macedon High School, where students performed in a cappella quartets and were evaluated by an adjudication panel. Students selected:

PROPOSITION 1

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to undertake a project consisting of certain capital improvements including additions to, and reconstruction of the District's Elementary School Building and Junior-Senior High Building, including the addition of four new classrooms, demolition, site improvements, original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for such purposes, architectural fees, and all other necessary costs incidental to such work, at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$5,000,000; and obtain the necessary funds by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District to be collected in annual installments with such tax to be partially offset by state aid available therefore, in the years and in the amounts as the Board of Education shall determine in accordance with Section 416 of the Education Law, and in anticipation of such tax shall the District be authorized to issue up to \$5,000,000 of obligations of the District?

PROPOSITION 2

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to undertake a project consisting of certain capital improvements including additions to, and reconstruction of the District's Junior-Senior High School Building together with improvements, upgrades and renovations to the District's outdoor track and fields, including construction of a synthetic turf athletic field and all weather synthetic surface 8-lane track with additional lighting, bleachers, sound system and drainage improvements, including demolition, site improvements, original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for such purposes, architectural fees, and all other necessary costs incidental to such work, at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$1,654,000; and obtain the necessary funds by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District to be collected in annual installments with such tax to be partially offset by state aid available therefore, in the years and in the amounts as the Board of Education shall determine in accordance with Section 416 of the Education Law, and in anticipation of such tax shall the District be authorized to issue up to \$1,654,000 of obligations of the District?

ABSENTEE BALLOT APPROVED

The Board of Education of the Lyons Central School District has authorized the use of absentee ballots. Absentee ballots may be used for the election of school board members, adoption of the annual budget, as well as any other referenda.

Voters who would like to use an absentee ballot must obtain an application either by mail or in person. Requests for applications that are mailed to the district must be received by the District Clerk at least seven days before the election. An application may be obtained in person up to and including the day before the election by stopping at the District Office.
