As we go to press it appears that real winter has finally arrived, but the cold and snow cannot put a damper on the energy and passion of the members of our school community. This month we are happy to applaud noteworthy accomplishments on the parts of students who are just beginning their educational careers and those who are preparing for post-secondary school experiences.

In a county-wide coloring contest sponsored by the Livingston County Council on Alcohol and Substance Abuse's (LCCASA) Prevention/Education program, two of our Dalton First Graders were recognized for their artistic accomplishments. Savanah Vasile won the Grand Prize, receiving a \$20 gift certificate. Megan Wilson won First Place in the division, and was awarded a gift bag. We congratulate our winners, and commend all of our First Graders for participating. Special thanks go to Mrs. Piraino who helped coordinate the contest entries!

As many of you are aware, we offer students the opportunity to get a "head start" on their college careers through our participation in Genesee Community College's Accelerated College Enrollment (ACE) Program. ACE challenges and motivates students with advanced coursework and provides quality instructors who have Genesee Community College adjunct status. ACE students pay a lower tuition rate than traditional students-typically one-third the cost of regular college tuition. The college credits earned in these courses will transfer to SUNY colleges and most two/four year colleges and universities throughout the state and country if a student has earned a C or better in the course. In a recent letter from Kathy Lopes, the Associate Dean for GCC's ACE Program, Keshequa was commended for having 13 students- the second highest number of pupils enrolled among all participating highs schools- who are considered full time GCC students due to their Fall 2006 course load. Ms. Lopes credits this achievement to our teachers who have taken the extra step to become approved as adjuncts, and our students (and their parents) for accepting the challenge of enrolling in college level courses and recognizing the value of taking these classes. As a district, we will work hard to continue to provide multiple opportunities for our students to be successful and prepared for the future.

Information on ADHD

As an attempt to provide the community with up to date information on elements that can interfere with normal learning and child development, I will give some brief information this month about ADHD. In following issues I will discuss other factors that may affect student learning.

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (commonly known as ADHD) is one of the most common learning and behavior problems affecting students. It can interfere with a student's ability to concentrate, follow directions, remain still for long periods of time, and control impulsive behavior. It is acknowledged that people who have ADHD are often very bright and creative, but have difficulty with schoolwork, social relations and behaving appropriately.

Research over the past 30 years has shown that ADHD is not caused by a bad attitude or by being lazy. It is a neurological disorder that affects how the brain takes in and uses information. While there does not appear to be a single cause, research has shown that genetic factors have a significant influence. Other environmental factors may play a role also.

There are thought to be three different types of ADHD. **Inattentive**: People have problems with inattention and are distractible. **Impulsive/hyperactive**: People have problems primarily with impulsivity and overactivity. **Combined inattention and impulsivity/hyperactivity**: People have elements from the first

two. This is the most common form.

The American Psychiatric Association has defined ADHD as consisting of a set of 18 possible symptoms. While too many to list here, consultation with your child's physician or school personnel can give you an idea of some of the signs. It is generally thought that signs of ADHD are usually present by the age of 7.

ADHD is diagnosed by a health or mental health professional – usually a physician or a psychologist. While school personnel generally do not diagnose ADHD, their information concerning behavioral observations and information about the student's academic and cognitive skills is extremely important to the person making the diagnosis. Assessment in school can be done to rule out other learning and/or emotional disorders that often have similar behavioral symptoms to ADHD.

In school ADHD may affect student performance by making it hard for students to pay attention, write down information, and complete work. Students with ADHD often have a hard time breaking down longer assignments into smaller chunks. Students with ADHD often display impulsive behaviors, which may lead to disciplinary problems.

Parents are encouraged to consult with their student's teachers if they feel that ADHD issues may be affecting their student's academic and social development. Consultation with our dis-

trict school psychologists is another way to gain valuable information concerning ADHD and possible school-based interventions.

If a child is diagnosed with ADHD, several school-based interventions can be developed to help students cope so that they are able to continue growing from an academic and social perspective. The most important intervention is the development of a partnership between the students family and school staff to create an individual plan. Some plans may include monitoring student performance over time, while others may be more intense based upon the child's needs. If ADHD significantly impacts a student's ability to learn, Special Education resources may be available. For other students whose ability to learn are not as affected, school plans that are less invasive (such as behavior plans, increasing daily structure, social skills building, increased home-school communications, etc.) can be developed. Outside of school there are several medically-based interventions for ADHD that can be developed by working with a physician, psychiatrist or psychologist.

- In order to receive aid of any kind; scholarships, grants and loans, the parents and students must complete the FAFSA form—" Free Application for Federal Student Aid".
- The FAFSA can be completed on the website: www.fafsa. ed.gov or by using the paper application that is available from the counseling office.
- If you will be completing the FAFSA online you must apply for a PIN at www.pin.ed.gov this is used as an electronic signature.
- The data you will be using to complete the form will be the parents and the student's 2006 tax information.
- Be sure to check the financial aid deadlines for the colleges you are applying to.
- If you have any questions I encourage you to call 1-800-4-FED-AID. You may also be interested in participating in the SUNY Statewide Student Financial Aid Day where counselors will work with you individually to help you complete the financial aid application.
