### What is RTI? by Craig Benson

RTI stands for Response To Intervention and is an acronym that you will begin to hear a lot of as schools across the country, including ours, move to this data-based intervention model. RTI requires that schools organize their intervention resources into levels of increasing intensity. Students who are identified as being at-risk for school failure receive support, have goals set for improving their performance, and are monitored to ensure interventions are having a positive effect. As a school-wide initiative, RTI provides a philosophy and blueprint that empowers school stakeholders to share their problem-solving resources to attain positive academic outcomes for the greatest number of students (Wright, 2007). RTI will allow us to combine all of our individual methods of student support (for example, AIS, SAP, Special Education, Reading Remediation, etc.) into a unified system of support.

The Reading First Program at Dalton Elementary is a wonderful

example of RTI. Intervention resources are arranged in three levels or tiers, each providing increasingly more intense services. Our district is currently investigating ways to more broadly implement the basic principles of RTI throughout all grades and academic programs. Schools across New York State are currently investigating RTI methods and best practices in an attempt to fully implement this practice.

At KCS an RTI Leadership Team was established in the fall of 2006. This team has branched out into several areas and has conducted a great deal of research on methods and best practices. Specifically, the team has looked at research-based interventions (what are the best research practices for students who struggle with academic achievement, work production, behavior management and social/emotional development), how to use current building-level teams to identify and monitor students, and how to develop different tiers of intervention across grade levels. Tier I interventions

are universal and available to all students in a classroom and implemented by the classroom teacher. Tier II interventions are more individualized, and tailored to the unique needs of students who have not responded to Tier I. Tier III interventions are the most intense, and reserved for students with chronic and severe academic delays and generally require special education support.

Our Leadership Team has developed several objectives for this school year, with the end goal being a single unified system of support. We will continue to look at all relevant issues in fully developing the principals of RTI into our school system.

### Emergency Go Home Drill October 12, 2007 by Marilyn Capawan

Each year, school districts are required by Education Law to conduct an Early Dismissal "Go Home Drill" to ensure that we are appropriately prepared to transport all students to their homes, or other parent-designated area, should there be an emergency. The drill requires that we not dismiss students any earlier than fifteen (15) minutes from the normal dismissal time, and we must account for all students during this time period.

On Friday, October 12, Keshequa Central will conduct this drill. As per our policy, there will be no change of bus pass issued on this day or any other. In addition, if you plan to pick your child up on this day to transport him or her home, we ask that your child participate in the drill first. After attendance has been taken on each bus, your child will be allowed to disembark and proceed home with you, provided proper notification has been received. We ask that these requests be made only as necessary in order to help minimize confusion for this drill. I'm sure you can understand the need for us to practice our plan in the event we should ever have to put it in place.

Most students will arrive home at their usual time even though they will be dismissed from their buildings fifteen (15) minutes early, as this time will be used to take attendance and account for every student. However, there will be some students who may arrive home earlier, particularly those who are dropped off before the buses arrive at the Nunda building. Please be prepared to receive them so that our drill may continue in a timely fashion.

There will be complete silence during this drill and it will be conducted in a formal manner. Please talk about the importance of this drill with your child(ren), as their safety and security are top priorities to all of us.

#### Academic Intervention Services Improve Student Performance by Christine Antalek

Keshequa Central School provides a number of Academic Intervention Services for students who are at risk of not meeting the New York State standards. A total of 293 students received some form of services last year, and 54 students attended the K-6 summer program for AIS in math, reading, and writing. 110 students were close to meeting the standards and were monitored for academic progress in their regular classes.

The district offers extra help services in reading/writing, math, science and social studies in a variety of ways. Students may be given extra time during the school day for remedial study, and teaching assistants or specialists may push in to a classroom to work with small groups of students. Special education teachers may focus on skills and content during their time with children, and classroom teachers may group students according to need in their classrooms and differentiate their instruction while monitoring progress.

Because New York State is now giving assessments in math and English language arts every year in grades 3-8, we are able to monitor the progress each child makes from year to year. Parents receive a report that shows not only the level of progress, but also a scale score for each test. A scale score of 650 indicates that the student met the benchmark and received a 3 on each test.

Of the students currently in grades 6-9, 79% of students who received intervention services last year improved their English language arts scale scores, and 77% improved their math scale scores. Students who are currently in grades 4 and 5 and who received AIS last year had their progress monitored also. In English language arts, 64% of students who received AIS improved their scale scores, and 50% of those students improved their math scale scores.

Teachers use the progress report and the scale scores to determine how much intervention a student needs. Parents of students who will receive AIS during the 2007-08 school year can expect to receive notice of the services we are providing students in early October.

#### Physical Education News



The Physical Education program is getting under way, eager to try new things in hopes of encouraging our students to be active and stay active. Some of the new activities we are integrating into our curriculum are elements of the "Bigger, Faster, Stronger," fitness program. As part of our daily warm-ups,

we will be instituting the use of agility ladders, plyometric platforms, resistance tubes, medicine balls, speed hurdles, and reaction balls. Each month we will focus on a new element, along with our regular warm-ups and stretches.

The Middle School activities are team oriented, with soccer, volleyball, basketball, softball, team building and trust activities. This is a progression from the Elementary, where spatial awareness, ball handling skills, and other complex motor skills are stressed, along with lead up games to team and individual sports. The High School curriculum focuses on lifetime sports. Some examples of activities include golf, tennis, cross country skiing, kayaking, archery, and use of the weight room. At this level the NYS Learning Standards stress "acquiring knowledge and skills to be competent or proficient in physical activities, to be able to design personal fitness programs and to be able to access and evaluate physical resources in their communities. Thanks to a grant worth more than \$8500 from the Livingston County Office of Workforce Development a handful of students found themselves "on-the-air" at Radioactive 93.5fm this past summer, right inside our high school technology wing. The summer career exploration program in radio offered students the ability to 'learn and earn' as they took on the roles of DJ, copywriter, censor, personnel manager, technical specialist, programmer, and the like.

Technology teacher Randy Swartzfager provided the students with specialized radio communication training, while Business teachers Shawn Bielicki and Rick Riggi shared the responsibility of teaching the students occupational skills. "The philosophy of the summer program was that students learn best when doing," commented Riggi.

Throughout the program students got to see what they learned inside the classroom applied in the real world. Students learned that it takes a lot more than someone behind a microphone with a CD to run a radio station. They also learned employability skills, teamwork, computer skills, and communication skills. Students toured radio stations in Dansville, Warsaw, and Rochester, and made several professional contacts.

"We wanted the kids to make connections between school and work and hopefully develop a plan, stay in school, and reach their goals," stated Bielicki, who wrote the grant on behalf of the district. "Collectively, I think we did that." This was the third consecutive year that KCS hosted the in-house radio station.

### **Civil War is Just Beginning!**



Mrs. Prinzi's 8<sup>th</sup> Social Studies students will be studying the second half of American History this year, beginning with the 1850s and the 1860s. Students will begin by exploring how and why our nation began to divide between North and South and eventually end up in Civil War. In September, students did some role-playing during class as Senators tried to pass bills in an increasingly divided Senate floor. We then toured the Civil War Encampment at the Granger Homestead in Canandaigua. Students observed original artifacts from the time period and watched re-enactors display real activities that took place in a Civil War camp in the 1860s. This is just the beginning of what we believe will be a very exciting and enriching year in 8<sup>th</sup> grade Social Studies!
