Hosted by Ron Macomber, Jr. (High School math) and Carol McCarville (Elementary Title I Math), these evenings will center around math and problem-solving skills needed not only in school, but post-graduation as well. Parents will spend the first hour taking part in activities ranging from ranking skills desired by Fortune 500 companies, identifying those skills found in math instruction, to taking part in solving a problem as a team just as their children might in class! Through these activities and the follow-up discussion, Mr. Macomber and Mrs. McCarville hope to empower parents with a greater realization of the skills involved in problem-solving activities, how they relate to math both in and beyond school, and some strategies for helping their children become better problem solvers at home.


As part of the No Child Left Behind Act, New York State has once again revamped the Learning Standards and

Title I: Some Facts for Parents

Title I is the name of a grant program from the United States Department of Education designed to help students achieve the rigorous curriculum standards set forth by the No Child Left Behind legislation. It is the largest federal education program for elementary and secondary schools in the United States. Each state receives part of the \$12.7 billion in federal funds that was appropriated for this school year. We applied to the New York State Education Department during the summer for a portion of these state funds.

Keshequa receives funding from Title I, Part A, which specifically targets academic achievement for students who need additional assistance. Other Title grants target areas like profession-

al development, use of technology in instruction, innovative programming, and school safety. We use the Title I, Part A monies to help pay salaries of remediation and summer school teachers, provide supplies and materials to remediation programs, and fund professional training for teachers to increase student achievement.

As with any grant, there are requirements that schools must follow if they accept these federal funds. We must complete a budget as part of the grant application and follow it during the course of the year. We need to report the numbers of students who receive help as part of the Title I grant. We must communicate with parents if their children are receiving extra aca-

ademic help through Title I services, like academic intervention. Also, a new law requires us to set aside a small portion of the Title I funds to assist any homeless children in our schools.


Middle School Corner

art, music, computer lab, or library skills. Parents and guardians are encouraged to ask their children about updating their school supplies such as pencils, note pads, and paper.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held between November 14th thru November 22nd with the majority of the conferences being held on Monday, November 21st and Tuesday, November 22nd. If you were unable to meet with your child's teachers during those scheduled times, please feel free to contact your child's teachers and make an appointment to discuss your child's academic progress.

It is very important that parents/guardians and teachers work together to make academic development a major emphasis during these years of transition for Middle School students. It is important that parents and teachers provide informal intellectual activities, communicating the value of academic growth in conversations, and holding high expectations that will deliver a very important message to our adolescents. The following are a few suggestions for promoting success for Middle School students: plan a family outing such as going shopping, going on a picnic, going on an all day hike, or plan a research project on a topic that both you and your child are interested in; talk and listen to your child about school activities during the instructional day and about after school activities; recognize your child academic accomplishments, even if the grades are not all A's; encourage civic groups to invite students to breakfasts and lunches to recognize their achievements, encourage groups to let students speak about their research projects or experiences and then have community members show recognition and express appreciation for the student's work.

As adults we should be talking to our students about the importance of academic growth. We should be encouraging them to plan on going beyond a high school diploma to achieve a job or position in the work world that would be en-

joyable and provide them with a means of a living. Remember they are our future and they will become the leaders of tomorrow. We best train them well now!

Our Middle School students also participated in the Livingston County Fire Essay contest by writing essays on how fire can be prevented and the importance of practicing fire safety in our homes. We are hoping that many of our students will be recognized for writing some outstanding essays. We look forward to hearing the announcement of the recognition of the essay winners in the Spring of 2006.

French Department News

The French Department is planning some very exciting and different activities this year.

Mrs. Noble, French teacher grades 7-12, had the wonderful opportunity to serve as an interpreter for a group of visitors from Bamako, Mali this summer. Mali is an extremely poor African country whose official language is French. Bamako is a sister city of Rochester, NY. During this visit, Mrs. Noble became friends with Mahamane Touré who teaches English to grades 7-12 in Bamako. Mr. Touré and Mrs. Noble are setting up a cultural exchange via the internet for their students.

Mrs. Noble has also been chosen to be a part of an online pilot program for the Assessment of Listening Proficiency

project. This pilot relies heavily on computer technology and all levels of Mrs. Noble's classes will be participating in an online listening comprehension test sometime later in the school year. This testing program will provide Mrs. Noble with a benchmark of each student's overall performance and will also provide feedback about how her classes did on a variety of topics. Best of all, this assessment program is entirely free.

In April the French students will once again be going to Nazareth College to participate in a play given by the Foreign Language students at Nazareth.

Baby Sitters' Training Course

Starting this year Seventh Graders will be instructed in the American Red Cross Baby Sitters' Training Course as part of their Home and Careers Class. Miss Gottschall became certified to teach this valuable course. The course will aid students to become safe, responsible, and successful babysitters at home and in the community. A good babysitter uses leadership, basic care, safety, safe play, and first aid. Babysitters' Training has been designed around those major themes. The students will have the use of the Red Cross handbook along with two choking infant mannequins borrowed from Northern Livingston County American Red Cross to practice these skills. Students who have already been certified will have an opportunity to increase their skills and knowledge.

Foods Class Speaker

Area restaurant owner and operator Bob Kelly of Bill's Restaurant in Nunda

spoke to the High School Foods Class on November 14. The once hot dog and ice cream stand now is a full service restaurant that caters to the needs of the area. Mr. Kelly explained the importance of having a college education. He also mentioned how working as a waitress or waiter can be a good job opportunity for college students. Mr. Kelly's food career started while he was in the military service and continued in Texas as a manager in several food related occupations. The candid talk about the restaurant trade enlightened his audience. Calculating the amount of food to purchase and meeting the increasing cost of specific foods (especially beef prices) made the class more aware of the difficulties that a restaurant owner faces. Mr. Kelly also stressed the importance of being a social person. If you are not a "people person" the restaurant business probably isn't the career or job path one should take. The class appreciated Mr. Kelly for coming in on his day off to share his knowledge.




National Junior Honor Society




