A new school year often inspires us to set new goals, make positive changes, and challenge ourselves to excel. The focus of this meeting will be Student Achievement. I will be there, along with Board members, to review recent test results and talk about our programs. More details are in this newsletter. Speaking of communication, we appreciate your positive feedback on the Parent Broadcast system and we will continue to use it to keep you informed of events throughout the year.

On a personal note, thank you for the many words of support and encouragement you've given me in my new role as Assistant Superintendent. I have been listening and learning and will continue to do so in order to provide the leadership our district deserves. Emergency School Closings

When schools must be closed, the decision is made by the Superintendent of Schools based on available information and recommendations. If the decision is made to close the schools, the Superintendent informs the following radio and television stations which then broadcast the information immediately:

WHAM (1180AM) WKBW (channel 7)
WBEE (92.5FM) WROC (channel 8)
WPXY (97.9 FM/1280AM) WHEC (channel 10)
WDNY (93.9 FM/1400AM) WOKR (channel 13)

If the schools must close during the day, parents should make sure children know in advance what to do should they come home unexpectedly and find no one there. Prior arrangements should be made to have children cared for until a parent arrives home.

Early Dismissal Drill by Marily Capawan, Assistant Superintendent

Each year, school districts are required by Education Law to conduct an Early Dismissal "Go Home Drill" to ensure that we are appropriately prepared to transport all students to their homes, or other parent-designated area, should there be an emergency. The drill requires that we not dismiss students any earlier than fifteen (15) minutes from the normal dismissal time, and must account for all students during this time period.

On Thursday, November 9, 2006, Keshequa Central will conduct this drill. As per our policy, there will be no change of bus pass issued on this day or any other. In addition, if you plan to pick your child up on this day to transport him or her home, we ask that your child participate in the drill first. After attendance has been taken on each bus, your child will be allowed to disembark and proceed home

with you, provided proper notification has been received. We ask that these requests be made only as necessary in order to help minimize confusion for this drill. I'm sure you can under-



stand the need for us to practice our plan in the event we should ever have to put it

Most students will arrive home at their usual time even though they will be dismissed from their buildings fifteen (15) minutes early, as this time will be used to take attendance and account for every student. However, there will be some students who may arrive home earlier, particularly those who are dropped off before the buses arrive at the Nunda building. Please be prepared to receive them so that our drill may continue in a timely fashion.

There will be complete silence during this drill and it will be conducted in a formal manner. Please talk about the importance of this drill with your child(ren), as their safety and security is top priority to all of us.

Key Club is Revitalized!



The Six Pillars of | 10 Ways for Parents to Help Teachers

Many teachers have written to me over the years, frustrated with how unprepared their students are – and they don't mean academically. Chris, a kindergarten teacher, wrote what many teachers have expressed, "I would love it if you could write a 10 tips for parents to help us teachers do our increasingly demanding job. Many parents of children I teach have left the job of spiritual, character, and social/emotional education to me. I can't do it all in addition to teaching academic skills. I'm getting burned out and pretty soon won't have the energy left to nourish one child let alone 25."

So here goes - my 10 tips:

- 1. Create a smooth takeoff each day. Give your child a hug before she ventures out the door and you head to work. Look her in the eye, and tell her how proud you are of her. Your child's self-confidence and security will help her do well both in school and in life
- Prepare for a happy landing at the end of the day when you reconvene. Create a predictable ritual such as 10–20 minutes listening to your child talk about his day - before you check phone messages, read the mail, or begin dinner. That way you are fully present to listen, and your child has a touchstone he can count on between school and home.
- 3. Fill your child's lunchbox with healthy snacks and lunches. Have dinner at a reasonable hour and a healthy breakfast. A well-balanced diet maximizes your child's learning potential.
- Include calm, peaceful times in your children's afternoons and evenings. Maintain a schedule that allows them to go to school rested, and if they are sick, have a system in place so they are able to stay home.
- Remember it's your children's homework, not yours. Create a specific homework space that's clutter-free and quiet. Encourage editing and double-checking work, but allow your kids to make mistakes, as it's the only way teachers can gauge if they understand the material. It's also how children learn responsibility for the quality of their work.
- **Fill your child's life with a love for learning** by showing him your own curiosity, respecting his questions, and encouraging his efforts.
- **Fill your home with books to read,** books simply to look at, and books that provide answers to life's many questions. The public or school library is an excellent resource.
- Be a partner with your child's teacher. When you need to speak to him or her in reference to a specific issue with your child, do it privately, not in front of your child. Make a point never to criticize your child's teacher in front of your child.
- 9. Set up a system where routine items are easily located such as backpacks, shoes, signed notices. Create a central calendar for upcoming events to avoid the unexpected.
- 10. Tuck a "love note" in your child's lunch bag to let her know how special she is. Knowing they are loved makes it easier for children to be kind to others.
