Board Letter

1. Windmill Update: We met with Kevin Schultz of Sustainable Energy Development (SED) this week. He will be getting his proposal for the study to us next week. His company has installed a number of windmills through out the northeast and appears very capable. I had met Kevin once before about three years ago through our Board President. The study will take 6 months. Development of the architectural plan including all permitting will take another six months. The actual construction will take two months. His company would oversee all aspects of the project through start up and operation.

If we did not want to own the windmill, he has capital investors who would own the windmill and sell the electricity back to us at a discount. The advantage of this set up is that there is no capital risk to us. The disadvantage is that we do not see as great a return on the windmill and still are not in control of our own energy.

At last night's three Board meeting, the Town of Ontario expressed interest in working with us on the project. They would use the electricity for their town hall and fire department. There are some municipal cooperation grants out there that might help offset some costs. Speaking of costs, the study is more than I anticipated. SED estimates the cost to be \$60,000, while it can be run through the project and generate 76% aid, it is still three times what we estimated. There are some NYSERDA grants that we could apply for. The problem with them appears to be that because of when those are decided, it could delay the project 6-8 months. We are exploring that avenue.

Last night on the news, they showed the new hydrogen fuel cell car being built in Honeoye Falls for GM. They expect to have it in the showrooms by 2015. The program said the hydrogen would be produced via cheap electricity from such things as windmills. Who knows, we may be using the excess electricity produced at night to refuel our buses.

- 2. <u>Month County Sales Tax:</u> The repayment plan is now set for the sales tax. Yesterday our attorney submitted to the county the vouchers for reimbursement to each school district. This will include all costs and legal fees we paid in the lawsuit. The county says it takes 30 days to process payments so we should get ours around Christmas. Maggie Brooks wasted a lot of tax payer money with this.
- 3. <u>CSEA Monthly Meeting:</u> We had our November CSEA leadership meeting yesterday. It was a good session. We have developed a trusting relationship with each other (at least at the leadership level). One of the items we discussed was rolling our current contract forward for two additional years instead of

going through negotiations again. The CSEA contract ends June 30th 2010. We would need to begin negotiation in about a year. Rolling the contract forward would give us a contract through June 30th 2012. I like the idea for several reasons which I have listed below, but I would like to know your thoughts.

- ⇒ It allows us to plan our CSEA budget for the next three years
- ⇒ It avoids a cantankerous negotiation process through difficult economic times which in the end will probably have the same results.
- ⇒ CSEA helped us during our lasy negotiation process by being the first to agree to reduce their insurance program to a Blue Point II \$20 co-pay with a 10% contribution. I don't think they should have to lead the way again. This would put the teachers next.
- ⇒ The salary increases are 65 cents or 3.5%. The 3.5% is lower than either the teacher or administrative unions which are at 4.25% and 4%. For some, the 65 cents would be more than 4% but only for our lowest paid workers.

These are the thoughts of Greg, Mark and I, however it is your thoughts that count. Please email me with your opinions on whether I should continue to explore this with CSEA.

4. <u>Budget Work</u>: We have been busily working on our budget. Although this is very early to begin this, these are different times. Administrators are analyzing program to find ways to maintain as much of them as possible though sometimes in different ways. While we prefer not to make any cuts, the financial reality of the next 2-3 years is going to force some difficult decisions.

Often during these times, Board members can feel pressured by one group or another to preserve their favorite program. We have to be very careful not to make any promises that we can not keep. I suggest we listen with concern to what they are saying and keep that knowledge as we go through the process. Also, understand that this probably will be 2-3 years of a downturn so we want to be careful not to cut too much the first year.

We will bring our initial thoughts to the executive session of the December meeting.

5. Wayne County Budget: The County 2009 Tentative Budget got adopted this morning. It is \$160,512,259 as compared with \$165,545,736 for 2008. This is a \$5,033,477 decrease or 3% from last year. This results in \$35,066,207 distributed over a County assessed value of \$4,413,875,894. The 2009 tax rate will be \$7.94 down \$.50 from last year or about a 5.9% reduction.

zone to show compassion to others. At one point she even stood up for a disabled boy, Adam, who was going to kill himself that night had she not showed him compassion. She was known for her tolerance, kindness and compassion. The gunmens' best friend even commented on the fact that having killed Rachel was way out of line. Rachel often commented that she knew that she was going to die young and that would make an impact afterwards. It even went as far as on May 1998, she wrote in her journal "this is gonna be my last year Hope Hollenbeck Lord. I've done what I can. Thank you." By the pictures she

drew, the poems she wrote, and the conversations she had with

others, Rachel seemed to predict her fate,

Five challenges were given throughout the assembly. The 1st challenge was to not have prejudice. Because you never know what's going on behind the scenes, you should not pre-judge others. Rachel said that you need to give people at least three chances before you judge them. Challenge #2 was dare to dream, write down your goals and keep a journal. If one writes down their goals, then they have a better chance to accomplish them. One should always dare to dream because if you make up your mind ahead of time that you can't do something before you even try it, you're losing out. Rachel's role model was Anne Frank. She was influenced by her quite a bit. That's why she started keeping journals. The two girls parallel each other in a lot of ways, even though they were over 50 years apart. The two gunmen looked up to Hitler.

They were influenced by him and the violent things they watched. The boys actually planned so that the shooting took place on Hitler's birthday. This ties in with the 3rd challenge, input determines output and have good influences. However much you put into a situation is what you're gonna get out of it.

The 4th challenge was to commit little acts of kindness. Little acts of kindness go a long way and this relates back to the chain reaction. The last challenge was to go to the people you care about most on the Earth and tell them how much you care about them. Rachel's friend Nick says it best. "Treat others the way you want to be treated because you never know what tomorrow brings. You want to be okay with what you said if that person's not there tomorrow."

The FOR, Friends of Rachel, club is an outreach

for students. There are Chain Reaction teams that carry out the goals of the FOR club. They have a new student program that helps new kids make friends and adapt better. A Target Letter program, where teams send out letters to people within the school who feel they don't get enough appreciation.

There are days when the people in the FOR club sit with people from other cliques, than their normal ones. They also have programs where the teams reach out to students and give them encouragement.

These are all ideas though. What FOR is, is to make the school a better place. FOR will meet during the school day and won't be any longer than 30 minutes. Also, if you are a fan of myspace or facebook there is a FORspace on rachelschallenge.com. Rachel's Challenge is actually stopping violence. When Craig, Rachel's brother, was done speaking at a Texas school a kid came up to him,

handed him a hit list and said "You just saved a lot of lives."

Rachel's challenge has become a huge impact in schools and with people. When the newscast of when the shooting took place was shown, you could feel the heaviness in the air. Rachel wrote to her cousin "Don't let your character change color with your environment. Find out who you are and let it stay that color." She wanted acceptance, compassion, kindness and a chain reaction.

Her death was not in vain. The Columbine shooting left 13 dead, 27 wounded and 6 of the 13 died for their faith. Rachel was one who died because she was a Christian. We need to live our lives to the fullest but, also remember to think before we act. Rachel undoubtedly made a difference in the lives of many people.

Helping Better Our Community Through Service

As many of you know community service is a requirement of the class of 2009's participation in government class. For the class of 2010 and beyond you need 20 hours of community service just to graduate. For the class of 2009 the 15 hours needs to be done in one semester while your government class is in session. For 2010 and beyond it can be done between your freshman and senior year.

The definition of community service is to perform work for no monetary reward, so if you are getting paid for the work your doing, it is not community service. You may not perform community service for a family member unless pre-approved by the high school principal.

Students may not use court-referred hours to fulfill their graduation requirement. You may however use community service hours performed with a club and/or school sport team. You may be asking, "where do I start?" A few

ways to get started would be to contact a local service organization such as the community's Rotary and/or Lyons club, become a mentor for a young child, organize a study hour for young people, or coach a local youth sports team. Places like food kitchens, assisted living homes, or even somewhere like Lollypop farm is a great place to get involved.

Not looking to travel? The teachers in this school and the district could also be looking for help. Help your teacher clean their desk or help a teacher in the primary schools in a classroom.

Other local places are the Ontario and Walworth; libraries, food pantry, and recreational departments. Looking to get some experience and help out? Volunteer at our local hospitals.

Habitat for Humanity of Wayne County and Foodlink of Rochester are two other interesting, possible places. There is also the Ameri-

can Red Cross, Lung Association, and Heart Association. The Genesee Region Special Olympics, something that Wayne Central has participated in for many years, is another great idea.

There is always more community service ideas that are brought up on the announcements as well. Maybe you have your own idea, the possibilities are endless.

s everyone might already know, the James A. Beneway High School had the privilege to host twenty German exchange students for the past two weeks October 30th thru November 14th, as part of the GAPP exchange program. Although I didn't get the chance to get to know all of them personally, I could tell that they were all pretty awesome kids and I can't wait to meet them all again in April '09, when we return the visit by going to their home town of Weil der Stadt. During the two weeks we had to spend together we did some pretty killer stuff.

Before the German students came here, their trip to the US began in NYC, where they had to stay in a pretty nasty YMCA in Brooklyn. In order to use a bathroom, they had to take a flight of stairs either up or down. Luckily they just had to sleep at the Y, though the worst came when they asked if they could use the pool or workout facilities, and found a scant hour of 'teen swim' amidst the laps allotted to adults and families, and no time when it would be worth their while to skip sight seeing – which they did do with their usual gusto. Then they traveled to Rochester by bus, arriving just before Halloween.

Can you imagine piecing your costume together in 24 hours, having barely any idea what you were in for, and having just arrived in strangers' homes? Now, multiply that by 20! Most of us gathered for a quick party at one of the hosts' homes off Lincoln Road, with a bon fire and some pretty sweet food, and then we quickly split off to our own neighborhoods to do some trick or treating.

I'd have to say that laser tag was by far the best thing we did, not only because I got first place, but because it brought everyone together. When we went to play laser tag, I knew about five of the other German exchange students and by the end of the night I think I had talked to almost all of them. Even though it was meant to be a bonding experience (which it was) there was an American versus German game, which we won, O yeah! The

laughter was uncontrollable and everyone had a blast. It was by far one of the best

Despite the fact that the team will be graduating ten seniors, the JV team, who managed a phenomenal record of 14-3-1, will provide new blood the and high expectations for next season.





As I write this we have once again experienced you are currently investing another day where the DOW through payroll deduction index had another 300+ point intraday range. The last time it traded in \$8000 -9000 range was 2003, and if you are like me you have probably seen your IRAs and 403b take quite a hit since the all time high we reached in October 2007. The good news is that Teacher Retirement System is in good shape and your TRS retirement pension is safe.

There is however new IRS laws regarding 403b retirement investments that go As a result of these new regulations some companies have chosen not to continue in the 403b market. Please see the list that follows on page 2 of this issue of Wayne's World to see the status of your 403b company. This list changes on a regular basis, so please check http:// www.omni403b.com for an updated list. Once a company has a Green Check Mark or Red X next to its name then its status is confirmed.

"Green Check Mark": If with Wayne CSD in a company that has a "Green Check Mark" next to your 403b company's name then everything is all set and you do not need to do anything; unless you were already planning on making a change to your 403b.

pany has a "Red X" next to its name then your company has declined to continue its 403b services with our school district. Therefore if you wish to continue to invest in a 403b you will need into effect January 1st, 2009. to select a new company as of January 1, 2009 as the school district will no longer be able to legally withhold money from your paycheck to invest in your current company if it has a "Red X" next to its name. Depending on your 403b company you may also need to take action with your 403b account.

> "No Mark": If your 403b company has neither an "Green Check Mark or Red X" next to its name, then that company has yet to make a decision as to

whether or not it wishes to continue.

To put it simply, if your 403b retirement company does not have a "Green Check Mark" next to its name, then it is strongly recommended that you contact your financial advisor immediately and come up with a plan as to what you are going to do with money cur-"Red X": If your 403b com-rently in that 403b account and a plan as to how you are going to invest in the future if you wish to continue in a 403b after December 31, 2008. Neither Wayne CSD, Omni Group, nor the WTA can provide direct assistance to you on this matter, again, you need to contact your financial advisor or 403b Company.

> If you do wish to make a change or modify your 403b payroll deduction in the future, then you need to complete Salary Reduction Agreement through Wayne CSD's Human Resource office to authorize the deduction.


