RESIDENTIAL/INDEPENDENT LIVING SERVICES

Assistance with independent living, a place to live or respite services are examples of residential services. Once a person becomes an adult, it is a natural progression to desire personal independence. Some people are able to live independently in their own homes without any form of outside support or supervision. Others need some degree of assistance. Options for various levels of support are available for people who need them.

SUPPORTIVE APARTMENTS: Apartments that are individual or shared that provide staff contact at least one time a week or more often if needed. People living at this level of care need to be independent in ADL's, basic housekeeping, self medicating and self preserving, needing only minimal assistance to maintain independence.

SUPERVISED APARTMENTS: Apartments that provide for 24 hour supervision. People who live there are provided with support and training to increase independent living skills.

COMMUNITY RESIDENCE: Housing for generally 8-12 persons at one location where 24 hour supervision is provided. Persons must be able to care for most of their ADL's and be self preserving. People work on increasing their independent living skills.

INTERMEDIATE CARE FACILITY: Housing for generally 8-12 persons at one location where 24 hour supervision and assistance is provided for people who need intensive training and support. Generally geared to people who have significant medical considerations, behavioral considerations or are not able to be self preserving.

FAMILY CARE: A person with a developmental disability lives with a family. The family receives assistance and support through the DDSO case worker or other agency worker.

CASE MANAGEMENT: Assistance for people who are not living in an agency sponsored residential program. Individuals and families are assisted with coordination of, linkage to or advocacy with service providers and systems with which the individual or family comes in contact with.

HOMEMAKERS SERVICES: Assistance with home management or routine homemaker assistance for persons who are unable to perform these duties due to a disabling condition.

RESPITE: Periodic relief for families caring for a family member with a developmental disability.

EMERGENCY LIVING SHELTERS: Provides short term support and living arrangements for persons who are in need of housing due to a temporary crisis.

INDEPENDENT LIVING TRAINING: Training and assistance in developing independent living abilities for an individual with a disability.
